64 Channels Reserved

by the division engineers.

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The plan is to utilize the channel bands allocated for aeronautics by the Federal Radio Commission under its Short-Sort wave allocation of December. Capt. Hingsburg thinks the 64 channels reserved for aeronautics will be sufficient for radiotelephone and code purposes, along with the long waves yet to be obtained. Among the private operators, however, there is varying opinion as to whether the needs of aviation will be served by the particular channels allotted on account of the vagaries of the short waves.

The private stations will take the burden of traffic off the Government stations, which are to be engaged primarily in furnishing the weather data that the Government should be expected to furnish. Moreover, the Government fully intends to furnish the additional radiobeacon service by directive beacon transmitters are now being installed at Goshen, Ind.; Sterling, Ill.; York, Neb.; Des Moines, Ia., and Gothenberg, Neb.

It is not to be expected that private messages and the dispatching of planes should be done through the Government stations, although in these early days of aircraft radio it is consenting to co-operate in every way with the airways operators, Capt. Hingsburg stated. Concurrence with this view was expressed at the recent Washington conference of the transport operators' radio representatives, who have formulated their policies respecting radio.

To Operate Own System

They intend, they decided, to operate their own system, keeping commercial interests out of the field, but admitting additional operators to the co-operative if the traffic demands. Their chain will be operated purely on a non-profit making basis. They will ask the Federal Radio Commission, through the airways division, to assign them exclusive use of frequencies, and they will ask that near-by bands of wave-lengths be reserved for parallel chains that may be necessitated by expanded traffic.

Capt. Hingsburg and his division are co-operating in every way with the technical men representing the transport operators. The latter have organized a committee that has been engaged for several weeks in conferring with the Government officials in charge of radio research and administration and they have been investigating the different types of equipment now available, or promised by the manufacturers, for installation aboard their craft, both for receiving and transmitting.

The operators' committee is headed by Thorpe Hiscok of the Boeing Air Transport Company, and includes Herbert Hoover, Jr., son of the President-elect, who is joining the Western Air Express as technical assistant to Presi-

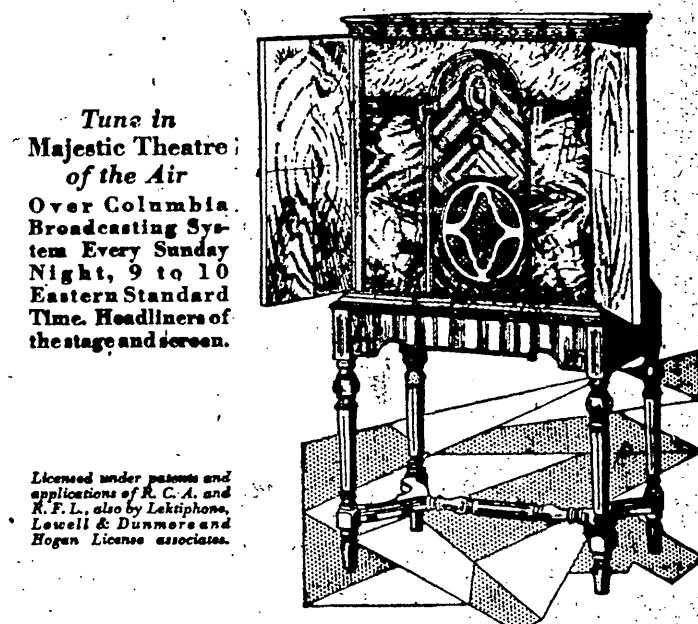
